Silent Final e



Job 1: *nam<u>e</u>*₁

The silent final e jumps over the consonant between the two vowels to make the a say \bar{a} . This is a Vowel/Consonant/Silent Final e pattern. We call this v/c/e pattern for short. In summary, silent final e makes the vowel says its name.

Job 2: res cue_2 hav e_2

English words do not end with u; we need a silent final e.English words do not end with v; we need a silent final e."English words do not end with v and u; that's job 2!"

Job 3: $chance_3$ $large_3$

Silent final e lets /c/ say 's'. Silent final e lets /g/ say 'j'. In other words, the silent final e makes the c and g say their second sound. "c and g, that's job 3."

Job 4: *lit* $tl\underline{e}_4$ (unc $l\underline{e}_4$ trou $bl\underline{e}_4$ puz $zl\underline{e}_4$ shuf $fl\underline{e}_4$ tur $tl\underline{e}_4$)

English syllables must have a written vowel; we need a silent final e.

Job 5: *ar<u>e</u>₅*

Silent final e has no role (for pronunciation), but it is required for spelling.

"Not to hear but to see."
